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INTRODUCTION

For Unit 11 you have been tasked to create a research project based on a scenario set out in your assignment brief.

The aim of this unit is to offer you the chance to engage in sustained research in a field of study. By the end of the Unit you should have demonstrated an ability and capacity to identify a research theme, develop research aims, objectives and outcomes, and to present the outcomes of such research in both written and verbal formats. Finally, this unit will encourage you to reflect on your own engagement within the research process during which recommendations for future, personal development will be key learning points.

Assignment 1 of 4 for this module is set out in to 4 Tasks which consist of;

- Defining a research question (Completing Section One of the Research Proposal Form)
- Literature Review
- Report; Justification of research methods and methodologies
- Research proposal

GUIDANCE

This document is prepared to break the unit material down into bite size chunks. You will see the learning outcomes above treated in their own sections. Therein you will encounter the following structures;

Purpose	Explains <i>why</i> you need to study the current section of material. Quite often learners are put off by material which does not initially seem to be relevant to a topic or profession. Once you understand the importance of new learning or theory you will embrace the concepts more readily.
Theory	Conveys new material to you in a straightforward fashion. To support the treatments in this section you are strongly advised to follow the given hyperlinks, which may be useful documents or applications on the web.
Example	The examples/worked examples are presented in a knowledge-building order. Make sure you follow them all through. If you are feeling confident then you might like to treat an example as a question, in which case cover it up and have a go yourself. Many of the examples given resemble assignment questions which will come your way, so follow them through diligently.
Question	Questions should not be avoided if you are determined to learn. Please do take the time to tackle each of the given questions, in the order in which they are presented. The order is important, as further knowledge and confidence is built upon previous knowledge and confidence. As an Online Learner it is important that the answers to questions are immediately available to you. Contact your Unit Tutor if you need help.
Challenge	You can really cement your new knowledge by undertaking the challenges. A challenge could be to download software and perform an exercise. An alternative challenge might involve a practical activity or other form of research.

Research Proposal (Section One, Project Proposal Form)

What is a Research Proposal?

A research proposal is essentially what is says on the tin. It is your opportunity to put forward your own ideas for research and to demonstrate that you have an idea that you want to address. You do not necessarily have to have all the answers yet at this point.

This will be an expression of your interest in the particular topic area and a chance for you to demonstrate some background knowledge of the subject before focusing on one or two significant questions in your chosen area of research.

The first thing you are going to need to do is to choose what you would like to conduct your research on. This is perhaps the most important part of your project as all the work you put into this module will be based on question or hypothesis that you set to base your research on. It is essential you firstly read up on the subject area, familiarise yourself with the readings available to you through the various sources; articles, journals, papers etc.

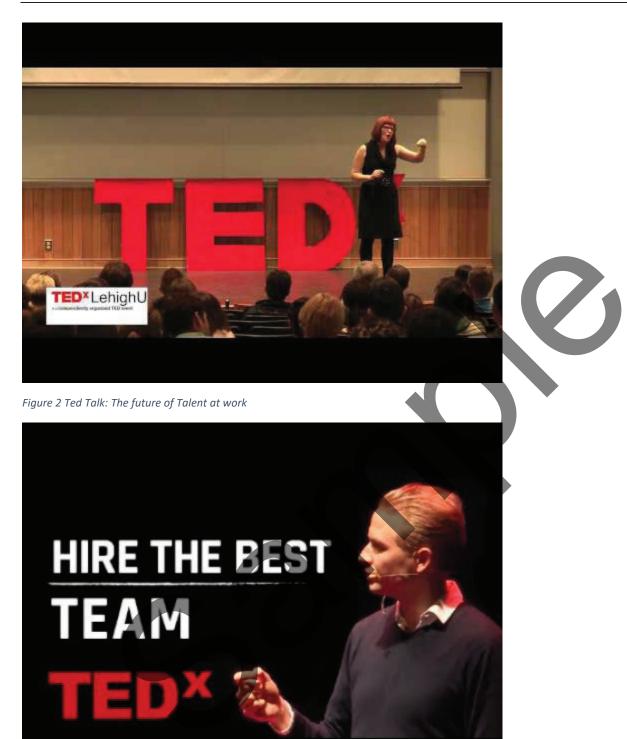


Figure 3 Ted Talk: How to master recruiting



Is My Research Question/Hypothesis Viable?

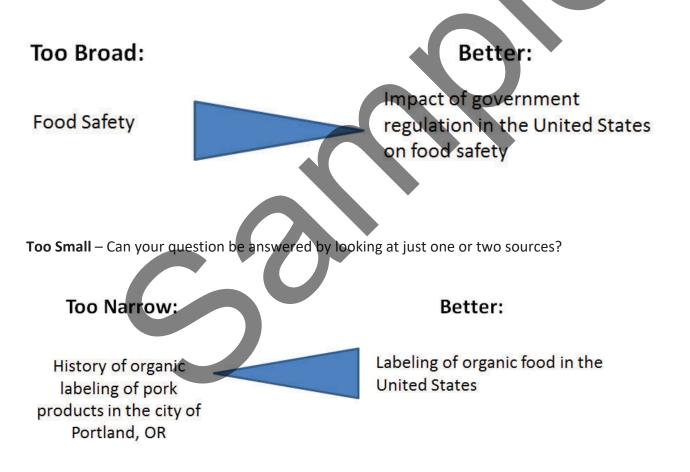
So, you have done your reading and have an idea on what question/hypothesis you want to address in your research. Before you now to commit to this it is best practice examine how feasible your question is. It is often the case that a research question can be too big of a question to be answered in a research study when taken in to account your limitations within the Unit. So, set yourself a reasonable goal, is the answer to what you asking obtainable?

Speak with your tutor for guidance when proposing your question.

Goldilocks Test/Principle

This is the idea that there is a happy medium for everything and It can also be applied to picking a good research question. To put it in to the context of your project.

Too Big – Is your research question too broad. Can this question be answered in a 10-15-page report or is it not feasible within the time constraints and resources available to you.



Just right – Are there enough sources out there for you to be able to challenge your objectives. Will the research you will be able to conduct on the topic be feasible from a geographical, monetary and Time sensitive standpoint.
